Councilmember Ceperley motioned to approve the appointment. Councilmember Hoover seconded. With members being present having voted in the majority as affirmative, with at least one (1) recognized Nay from Knauff, the Mayor declared the appointment approved.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC SAFETY

Councilmember Steele, Chair of the Council Committee on Public Safety, submitted the following reports:

1. Your committee on Public Safety has had under consideration the following resolution, and reports the same to Council with the recommendation that Resolution No. 660-22 be adopted.

Resolution No. 660-22 - WHEREAS, an excess levy election has been set for Tuesday, May 10, 2022, to provide the voters of Kanawha County the opportunity to approve an excess tax levy for the years beginning July 1, 2024, 2025, 2026, 2027 and 2028, to support the operations of the Kanawha County Emergency Ambulance Authority (KCEEA), which has established and maintains an emergency ambulance system for Kanawha County; the Kanawha Valley Regional Transportation Authority (KVRTA), the owner and operator of the public bus transportation system serving Kanawha County and its citizens; and the establishment of an Emergency Services Fund, to assist and support public law enforcement and public fire protection agencies within Kanawha County; and

WHEREAS, the proposed excess levy is needed for the continued operation of the Ambulance and Transportation Authority, and to assist local police and fire departments to meet the public safety concerns of the citizens and will be used to provide funds for the acquisition of equipment, capital improvements and to cover in part current general maintenance and operational expenses as well as match funds from the government of the United States and others; and

WHEREAS, the proposed levy rate was not increased to ensure that the Kanawha County taxpayers would not face any increase in the taxes allocated for these services.

Be it Resolved by the Council of the City of Charleston, West Virginia:

That City Council does hereby endorse the proposed special levy to be voted on May 10, 2022, and urges all eligible voters to vote for the levy to provide for the continued operation and expansion of the emergency ambulance system, the continued operation and improvement of the mass transportation system, and supplemental funding for public law enforcement and public fire protection agencies within Kanawha County.

Councilmember Steele added that the resolution is supporting the levy renewal. She requested that City Manager, Jonathan Storage explain the resolution. Storage added that this is a very essential levy that will appear on the May 10, 2022 primary ballot. It's primary purpose it to help support the ambulance service. It will also supplement the public emergency responses services of the City, and will continue funding for a special fund for emergency services, etc. There will be no increase to the levy rate.

Councilmember Steele moved to approve the resolution. Councilmember Ceperley seconded the motion. With members present recorded thereon as voting unanimously in the affirmative, the Mayor declared Resolution No. 660-22 adopted.

COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

Councilmember Reishman, Vice Chair of the Council Committee on Finance, submitted the following reports:

1. Your committee on Finance has had under consideration the following resolution, and reports the same to Council with the recommendation that Resolution No. 627-22 Committee Substitute be adopted.

Resolution No. 627-22 - Authorizing the Mayor or City Manager to grant American Rescue Plan Act (“ARPA”) funds to Girl Scouts of Black Diamond Council in the total amount of \$50,000 and to execute appropriate agreements establishing the terms and conditions imposed upon the recipient, including ongoing duties for reporting on expenditure and programmatic activities and binding covenants to spend funds in accordance with the purposes for which such funds were granted.

Be it Resolved by the Council of the City of Charleston, West Virginia:

That the Mayor or City Manager is authorized to grant American Rescue Plan Act (“ARPA”) funds to Girl Scouts of Black Diamond Council in the total amount of \$50,000 and to execute appropriate agreements establishing the terms and conditions imposed upon the recipient, including ongoing duties for reporting on expenditure and programmatic activities and binding covenants to spend funds in accordance with the purposes for which such funds were granted. The grant is approved in full or in part based upon information submitted to the City in the grant recipient’s City of Charleston ARPA grant application, attached hereto as Exhibit A. The City Manager is directed to withhold grant funding to the grant recipient should the City Manager determine that the grant recipient has failed to adhere to the obligations established in the agreement or fails to adhere to applicable local, state, or federal law.

Councilmember Reishman added that the grants for American Rescue Plan Act grants have been approved by the ARPA Advisory Committee and Finance Committee.

Councilmember Reishman moved to approve the resolution. Councilmember Ceperley seconded the motion. With members present recorded thereon as voting unanimously in the affirmative, the Mayor declared Resolution No. 627-22 adopted.

2. Your committee on Finance has had under consideration the following resolution, and reports the same to Council with the recommendation that Resolution No. 628-22 be adopted.

Resolution No. 628-22 – Authorizing the Mayor or City Manager to grant American Rescue Plan Act (“ARPA”) funds to WV Health Right in the total amount of \$1,500,000 and to execute appropriate agreements establishing the terms and conditions imposed upon the recipient, including ongoing duties for reporting on expenditure and programmatic activities and binding covenants to spend funds in accordance with the purposes for which such funds were granted.

Be it Resolved by the Council of the City of Charleston, West Virginia:

That the Mayor or City Manager is authorized to grant American Rescue Plan Act (“ARPA”) funds to WV Health Right in the total amount of \$1,500,000 and to execute appropriate agreements establishing the terms and conditions imposed upon the recipient, including ongoing duties for reporting on expenditure and programmatic activities and binding covenants to spend funds in accordance with the purposes for which such funds were granted.

The grant is approved in full or in part based upon information submitted to the City in the grant recipient’s City of Charleston ARPA grant application, attached hereto as Exhibit A. The City Manager is directed to withhold grant funding to the grant recipient should the City Manager determine that the grant recipient has failed to adhere to the obligations established in the agreement or fails to adhere to applicable local, state, or federal law.

Councilmember Reishman moved to approve the resolution. Councilmember Ceperley seconded the motion. With members present recorded thereon as voting unanimously in the affirmative, the Mayor declared Resolution No. 628-22 adopted.

3. Your committee on Finance has had under consideration the following resolution, and reports the same to Council with the recommendation that Resolution No. 629-22 be adopted.

Resolution No. 629-22 - Authorizing the Mayor or City Manager to grant American Rescue Plan Act (“ARPA”) funds to Manna Meal in the total amount of \$1,200,456 and to execute appropriate agreements establishing the terms and conditions imposed upon the recipient, including ongoing duties for reporting on expenditure and programmatic activities and binding covenants to spend funds in accordance with the purposes for which such funds were granted.

Be it Resolved by the Council of the City of Charleston, West Virginia:

That the Mayor or City Manager is authorized to grant American Rescue Plan Act (“ARPA”) funds to Manna Meal in the total amount of \$1,200,456 and to execute appropriate agreements establishing the terms and conditions imposed upon the recipient, including ongoing duties for reporting on expenditure and programmatic activities and binding covenants to spend funds in accordance with the purposes for which such funds were granted.

The grant is approved in full or in part based upon information submitted to the City in the grant recipient’s City of Charleston ARPA grant application, attached hereto as Exhibit A. The City Manager is directed to withhold grant funding to the grant recipient should the City Manager determine that the grant recipient has failed to adhere to the obligations established in the agreement or fails to adhere to applicable local, state, or federal law.

Councilmember Jones asked why the amount listed on the resolution was larger than the requested amount. Mayor Goodwin clarified that their two applications were combined at the request of the consultant for the total of \$1,200,456. Additionally, Exhibit A of their packet lists a breakdown of their proposal.

Councilmember Snodgrass requested that a representative from Manna Meal, Any Wolfe answer some questions. Councilmember Snodgrass commented that the amount to be awarded is more than their annual budget, and asked why they needed a food truck. Wolfe replied that the amount was to be spent over 4 years, and there are many people that would benefit from their services but would not be able to walk to their facility. Councilmember Snodgrass asked who their primary clients were. Wolfe replied that while they serve a variety of people, they do not keep track of them in such a database. Councilmember Snodgrass asked if they had a plan in place to combat litter from their truck. Wolfe replied that there will be trash cans readily available close to their food truck.

Councilmember Persinger asked if all of the money would be going towards a food truck. Wolfe replied that the \$970,000 request is for the food truck purchase and its operation for four years.

The other requested amount is to supplement their kitchen, food and food pantry, etc. Councilmember Persinger asked where the second application was, and was told by someone not heard that it was included in the packet.

Councilmember Cook asked what it has been like for Manna Meal since the pandemic. Wolfe replied that they served about 92,000 meals in 2019. Post-pandemic, they have served about 130,000 in 2020 and about 165,000 meals. Their food pantry has increased significantly as well. Councilmember Cook added that food security was a big issue in the US, as you do not visually hunger like you would other problems. Councilmember Cook asked where they got the idea to have a food truck. Wolfe replied that the truck will help people that can't get to their current location, and they get calls daily about that.

Councilmember Minardi asked if this would be like a delivery service. Wolfe replied that it would operate much like a traditional food truck.

Councilmember Faegre asked what the money for the four-year operating costs will go towards. Wolfe replied that it will be for the food truck, equipment for the truck, staffing, marketing and anything else directly associated with the food truck. Councilmember Faegre asked how many staff will be involved. Wolfe replied that there would be a part-time manager, three part-time employees and their own staff as supplemental labor. Councilmember Faegre asked what bids did they receive for the truck. Wolfe replied that they received two bids for 20-foot trucks and two bids for 18-foot trucks. The quotes ranged from \$231,000 to \$154,000. Councilmember Faegre commented that Meals On Wheels operates primarily through volunteers and donations.

Councilmember Knauff asked if the food truck would be taken to Kanawha City or South Hills. Wolfe replied that there were no current plans for that as part of the grant involved being in under-served areas, although she added that food insecurities did exist in those areas.

Councilmember Snodgrass asked for a breakdown of age and demographics. Wolfe replied that would be difficult to answer off the top of her head, and would be able to provide that answer later.

Councilmember Steele confirmed that the need for the food pantry has increased as well. Councilmember Steele asked if their Board had discussed using more environmentally friendly materials. Wolfe replied that they are definitely looking into that.

Councilmember Reishman moved to approve the resolution. Councilmember Ceperley seconded the motion.

Resolution No. 630-22 - Authorizing the Mayor or City Manager to grant American Rescue Plan Act (“ARPA”) funds to WV Food and Farm Coalition in the total amount of \$989,676 and to execute appropriate agreements establishing the terms and conditions imposed upon the recipient, including ongoing duties for reporting on expenditure and programmatic activities and binding covenants to spend funds in accordance with the purposes for which such funds were granted.

Be it Resolved by the Council of the City of Charleston, West Virginia:

That the Mayor or City Manager is authorized to grant American Rescue Plan Act (“ARPA”) funds to WV Food and Farm Coalition in the total amount of \$989,676 and to execute appropriate agreements establishing the terms and conditions imposed upon the recipient, including ongoing duties for reporting on expenditure and programmatic activities and binding covenants to spend funds in accordance with the purposes for which such funds were granted.

The grant is approved in full or in part based upon information submitted to the City in the grant recipient’s City of Charleston ARPA grant application, attached hereto as Exhibit A. The City Manager is directed to withhold grant funding to the grant recipient should the City Manager determine that the grant recipient has failed to adhere to the obligations established in the agreement or fails to adhere to applicable local, state, or federal law.

Councilmember Faegre spoke in favor of the resolution.

Councilmember Moore abstained from voting due to a pecuniary interest.

Councilmember Reishman moved to approve the resolution. Councilmember Ceperley seconded the motion.

5. Your committee on Finance has had under consideration the following resolution, and reports the same to Council with the recommendation that Resolution No. 631-22 be adopted.

Resolution No. 631-22 - Authorizing the Mayor or City Manager to purchase 70 new single space parking meters, meter housings, and associated accessories form Duncan Parking Technologies, Inc., in the amount of \$43,693.50, to be placed on Court Street as authorized in Bill No. 7937 and at rates authorized in Bill No. 7936.

Be it Resolved by the Council of the City of Charleston, West Virginia:

That the Mayor or City Manager is authorized to purchase 70 new single space parking meters, meter housings, and associated batteries, warranties and accessories form Duncan Parking Technologies, Inc., in the amount of \$43,693.50, to be placed on Court Street as authorized in Bill No. 7937 and at rates authorized in Bill No. 7936.

Councilmember Reishman moved to approve the resolution. Councilmember Ceperley seconded the motion. With members present recorded thereon as voting unanimously in the affirmative, the Mayor declared Resolution No. 631-22 adopted.

6. Your committee on Finance has had under consideration the following bill, and reports the same to Council with the recommendation that Bill No. 7928 Finance Committee Substitute

Bill No. 7938 Finance Committee Substitute - A BILL to amend and reenact Section 2-138 of the Municipal Code of the City of Charleston, as amended, relating to updating restrictions on certain municipal officers and employees eligibility for certain grant funds; creating exceptions; and creating ~~criminal and other~~ penalties for violation.

Now, therefore, be it ordained by the Council of the City of Charleston:

That Section 2-138 of the Municipal Code of the City of Charleston, as amended, be amended and reenacted to read as follows:

ARTICLE IV. – OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES.

DIVISION 1. – GENERALLY.

Sec. 2-138. - Standards of conduct of city officers and employees for federal grants; penalties.

(a) No municipal officer or employee for the city shall accept or receive directly or indirectly from any person known by such officer or employee to be interested in any bid, contract or purchase, by rebate, gift or otherwise, any money or other thing of value whatsoever or any promise, obligation or contract for future reward or compensation when such contract is to be funded in whole or in part by any federal grant funds. Any contract or purchase funded solely by nonfederal funds shall be governed by the provisions of W. Va. Code ch. 61, art. 5A (W. Va. Code § 61-5A-1 et seq.) relating to bribery and corrupt practices.

~~(b) No Municipal Officer, employees of the Mayor's office or heads of departments, their immediate family members or business in which such person has a direct financial benefit can financially benefit either directly or indirectly from funding from the city of Charleston. No municipal officer, or employees in the Mayor's office, heads of departments, immediate family members spouses of such persons, or business in which any such person has a direct financial benefit shall accept or receive any grant, incentives, or funding from the city or administered through the city, unless receiving such grant, incentives, or funding is based in part upon the person's low- or moderate-income status, as defined by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development. This prohibition includes prohibiting direct financial payments with the proceeds of city grants, grants, land or property to the any municipal officer, employees on in the Mayor's office, heads of departments, spouses of such persons, or business in which any such person has a direct financial benefit from third parties that first received city grant funding in order to fund their own programs. It is not a violation of this subsection if the individual receiving the financial benefit has previously obtained an opinion from the West Virginia Ethics Commission permitting the individual to receive the financial benefit. For the purposes of this subsection, terms used herein shall have the same definition as contained in W. Va. Code § 6B-1-3.~~

(c) Any person violating subsection (a) ~~or (b)~~ of this section relating to federal funds ~~or city~~

~~administered grants~~ shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$500.00 or by imprisonment not exceeding 30 days or by both fine and imprisonment. In addition to the criminal penalty, such officer or employee shall be subject to such disciplinary action as may be appropriate; and any such contract or purchase entered into ~~or grant awarded~~ shall be null and void.

(d) Any person violating subsection (b) of this section relating to city grants shall be subject to such disciplinary action as may be appropriate; and any such grant awarded shall be null and void.

Councilmember Adams added that the bill passed through the Ordinance and Rules Committee as a Committee Substitute, and was additionally amended by the Finance Committee, known as the Finance Committee Substitute to change “immediate family members” to “spouse” and to remove criminal penalties.

Councilmember Jones asked if their oath of office covered most of what was in the bill. Additionally, he was glad this subject was being discussed.

Councilmember Overstreet asked if someone was covered if they asked for advise from the City Manager or Attorney, and they in turn sought an opinion from the Ethics Commission. Councilmember Adams replied in the affirmative.

Councilmember Snodgrass added that when she presented the bill, she was looking for some check and balances, integrity and transparency. Their oath of office speaks directly to direct and indirect to franchise, supplies and contracts. Since the City has been receiving large amounts of money with the water crisis, ARPA, etc., it would be in their best interest to clean this up to protect themselves.

Councilmember Ceperley spoke against the bill, as the particular items in the bill are already covered by State Law. The Committee Substitute still makes the process unclear, which leads to the potential for unintended consequences and problems.

Councilmember Pharr added that if they are trying to be transparent, they needed to acknowledge the roots of the bill, which was because a Councilmember was awarded a grant. In fact, the Councilmember that was awarded a grant did everything that was mentioned in the proposed bill. She expressed concern that a Police Officer on the Board of Directors that received grant money would be in violation of the bill. Councilmember Adams replied that unless they were considered an elected official, Department Head, employee of the Mayor’s Office or a spouse of those, the bill would not apply to them. Additionally, it would not apply if they were not paid for being on the Board. Councilmember Pharr asked if a Councilmember would be in violation if they received reimbursement from a claim for damage to their vehicle since the City has received grant funding to pave streets. Councilmember Adams replied that they would not.

Councilmember Pharr added that former Councilmembers have worked for a non-profit (while in office) that directly received money from the City, without objection from any of the bill's sponsors. Councilmember Persinger replied that he became interested in the bill was because of the unprecedented large amounts of money that the City has been receiving. Councilmember Pharr asked if that was an issue during previous administrations. Councilmember Persinger replied that the City has never gotten \$50 million before. Councilmember Snodgrass added that the intent of the bill was not to address individuals who were on non-profit Boards.

Councilmember Cook added that if the scope of direct financial benefit could be explained in more detail. Councilmember Adams replied that the term direct financial benefit is not defined in the WV Ethics Act, so it would have to be interpreted. Councilmember Cook replied that if then codified such a term, then it would be impossible to know the ramifications of that. Councilmember Adams, agreed, added that he would think the term was referring to money in pocket. Councilmember Cook cautioned against the potential unknowns of the bill.

Councilmember Faegre asked if her contractor husband could bid on a City project. City Attorney, Kevin Baker, replied that the bill only applies to grants. Councilmember Faegre added that because of their oath, the bill is not needed.

Councilmember Reishman added that Councilmember abstain from voting when it is appropriate, and can seek opinions from the Ethics Commission, which is all that needs to be done.

Councilmember Steele added that the City is built on the backbone of small businesses. Councilmember Steele abstained from voting, and then withdrew her abstention under advisement.

Councilmember Adams moved to approve the resolution.
