MINUTES

**PARKS AND RECREATION COMMITTEE MEETING
THE MEETING WAS HELD IN PERSON IN THE AV ROOM
AT CITY HALL**

4:00 P. M., FEBRUARY 24, 2022

Larry Moore, Chairperson, called the meeting of the Charleston City Council Committee on Parks and Recreation to order at 4:00p.m., February 24, 2021.

A roll call was taken, and it was determined that a quorum was present.

1. Approval of Previous Minutes 7-29-2021–

Councilmember Robinson motioned to approve the minutes of the previous meeting on 7-29-2021. Councilmember Faegre seconded. There were no objections, and the minutes were approved.

February 24, 2022

2. Completed Parks and Recreation Projects –

Mayor Goodwin added that Parks and Recreation's success is a team effort led by Director Sayles. The extensive list (reproduced at the end of the minutes) is a testament to their hard work and accomplishments from the previous year.

Sayles added that her staff has worked countless hours, going above and beyond their duties.

The Cato Park project has begun, but is currently stopped until the weather gets warmer.

3. Upcoming Projects

Sayles stated that they have requested CDBG funds for some projects. One project that has been started is for automatic door openers at the Kanawha City, North Charleston, Roosevelt and MLK Centers. They will be updating the Admin building at Cato, fixing the front sidewalk at MLK, and replacing various park benches, etc. Bathroom stalls at MLK will also be updated, as well as various cardio equipment at all Centers.

Mayor Goodwin added that the 2 fields that cannot be re-turfed will be resurfaced.

Councilmember Robinson asked if Sayles could check on the bathrooms at North Charleston for Senior Softball. Sayles added that there are portable bathrooms there now.

Councilmember Robinson added that the Kanawha City Community Association is asking if the fenced K-9 training area in Kanawha City was still being used, and if not, could it be used for a dog park. Sayles replied that they might use it occasionally, but have mostly moved to a different location. She will check on that. They would need to figure out how to properly drain the area for a dog park.

Sayles added that they will also be installing a security camera system at the Kanawha City Rec Center.

4. Needs for Parks and Recreation –

Sayles stated that the Department didn't really need anything that they hadn't already asked for. They have received great support from the Administration.

5. Recruiting for Lifeguards and Other Summer Positions -

Sayles added that they are planning to partner with the YWCA and Legendary Lifeguards to help pay for certification costs. She added that last year they received many applications, but it was a challenge to get enough certified.

Councilmember Jenkins asked if they would certify some staff members as well. Sayles replied that it was too much of a liability to do that.

Councilmember Robinson confirmed that all of the City pools will be open this Summer.

Councilmember Jenkins asked if they would be drug testing before doing the certifications. Sayles confirmed that they would be.

6. Miscellaneous -

Councilmember King confirmed that there are plans to resurface the outdoor basketball court at MLK and NC.

Councilmember Robinson inquired as to the pickleball courts. Sayles added that 2 pickle ballcourts will fit into 1 tennis court, but will require another net. When they resurface, the essentially add a sealant to the area. Sayles added that they could add the lines and purchase a few portable nets, like at MLK.

Councilmember Jenkins asked if the pickleball courts were being used as he was concerned there would be conflicts with pickleball and basketball use. Sayles added that set up has worked at MLK.

Councilmember Robinson asked if the Department was still responsible for graffiti removal. Sayles replied that they were, but she would like to talk about that. Councilmember Robinson added that there is some graffiti on the underpass by CAMC. He added that another Department, like Public Works, should be responsible for that. Sayles added that it made since for them to remove graffiti in parks, but maybe not City-wide.

Councilmember Robinson rooted for the Cougars.

Councilmember Robinson motioned to adjourn the meeting.

DEED

THIS QUITCLAIM DEED OF REVERSION is made and entered into this 15th day of August, 2022, by **P.U.M.P., INC ENRICHMENT CENTER**, also known as **PEOPLE UNITED FOR MORE PROGRESS, INC.**, a West Virginia nonprofit corporation, party of the first part, and **THE CITY OF CHARLESTON**, a municipal corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of West Virginia, party of the second part.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Bill No. 6896, duly passed by the City Council of the City of Charleston, West Virginia, on April 1, 2002, authorized the City to donate property located at 143 Wertz Avenue to People United for More Progress, Inc., subject to certain restrictions, more particularly described below, and the proper business name for the entity was P.U.M.P., Inc Enrichment Center, all of which are collectively referred to herein as “PUMP, Inc.”; and

WHEREAS, Bill No. 6896, authorized and directed the Mayor of the City of Charleston to execute, acknowledge, and deliver a proper deed conveying any right, title and interest that the City of Charleston may have in the aforesaid portion of the property to PUMP, Inc. for the consideration of One Dollar (\$1.00); and

WHEREAS, the conveyance was made subject to a restrictive covenant requiring that PUMP, Inc. continue to use the property and all its structures for the purpose of making available to the general public these facilities for the appreciation, advancement, or enjoyment of cultural and educational activities open to the general public free from charge except as is necessary to provide the means to keep the building, facilities, and grounds in proper condition and repair, to pay the cost of insurance, care, management, operations, teaching and attendance, so that the general public may have the benefit of such establishment; and

WHEREAS, the conveyance was made subject to a restrictive covenant that PUMP, Inc. continues to be organized as a nonprofit, Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, corporation; and

WHEREAS, the conveyance was made subject to a restrictive covenant requiring PUMP, Inc. to maintain the property conveyed in accordance with the applicable building codes and ordinances; and

WHEREAS, if any of the restrictive covenants set forth therein were violated, the property would then revert to and vest in the City of Charleston, for the consideration of \$1.00, and PUMP, Inc. would thereafter have no interest, right or title therein; and

WHEREAS, PUMP, Inc. is not using the property and all its structures for the purpose of making available to the general public these facilities for the appreciation, advancement, or enjoyment of cultural and educational activities open to the general public; and

WHEREAS, PUMP, Inc. is no longer operating as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization; and

WHEREAS, PUMP, Inc. is not maintaining the property conveyed in accordance with the applicable building codes and ordinances.

NOW THEREFORE, Under the Quit Claim Deed executed by the parties on 18 July 2002 and recorded with the Clerk of the County Commission of Kanawha County, West Virginia, in Deed Book 2557 at Page 121, the City of Charleston is entitled to acquire the property at 143 Wertz Avenue, Charleston, West Virginia from Pump Inc., and Pump Inc. is required to transfer the property at 143 Wertz Avenue to the City of Charleston. Said property at 143 Wertz Avenue being that certain property more particularly bounded and described as follows:

All that certain lot or parcel of land, together with the improvements thereon and appurtenances thereunto belonging, situate in the City of Charleston, Kanawha County, West Virginia, and being all of Lots Eleven (11), Twelve (12), Thirteen (13), Fourteen (14), Fifteen (15), Sixteen (16), and Seventeen (17), as shown on the attached map entitled "Kanawha Addition," which map is of record in the office of the Clerk of the County Court of Kanawha County, West Virginia, in Photostatic Map Book 5 at page 29; and being the same real estate acquired by the Board of Education of the County of Kanawha in the following manner:

- (1) By deed from G.J. Floyd and Lillian H. Floyd to the Board of Education from Charleston Independent School District, dated March 15, 1928, and recorded in said Clerk's Office in the Deed Book 326, page 188, the party of the first part having succeeded to the title of said The Board of Education of Charleston Independent School District by operation of law.
- (2) By deed from W. M. E. Edwards, widower, to The Board of Education of Charleston Independent School District, dated April 1, 1930, and recorded in said County Court Clerk's Office in Deed Book 354, page, 452, the party of the first part having succeeded to the title of said The Board of Education of Charleston Independent School District by operation of law.
- (3) By deed from Emma W. Leviey and C. J. Leviey, her husband, dated December 7, 1944, and recorded in said Clerk's office in Deed Book, 687, page 401.
- (4) By deed from William H. Edwards and Lillian H. Edwards, his wife, and Imperial Building and Loan Association, a corporation, by deed dated December 7, 1944, and recorded in said County Court Clerk's Office in Deed Book 689, page 37. Reference is here made to said deeds for a further description of said real estate.


This reversion is made subject to any and all agreements, terms, conditions, stipulations, covenants, restrictions, exceptions, reservations, easements and rights-of-way of record in the office of the Clerk of the County Commission of Kanawha County, West Virginia, running with the land, visible upon the ground, or detectable by a true and accurate survey, which affect or apply to the property hereby conveyed, or any part or portion thereof; including without limitation all utility lines that cross over, under and/or through the property hereby conveyed.

Reference is hereby made to the foregoing instruments, maps, plats, declarations and such other instruments recorded in the Clerk's office for a description of the rights, interests, duties and obligations of the party of the second part, its successors and assigns.

DECLARATION OF CONSIDERATION OR VALUE: The City of Charleston hereby declares that this conveyance was made without consideration as a reversion requirement of the aforementioned deed is not subject to the State excise tax upon the privilege of transferring real estate for the reason that it is a transfer to or from the United States, the State of West Virginia, or to or from any of their instrumentalities, agencies, or political subdivisions.



Public Input Process Report
Riverview School Property
July 19, 2022



At the request of Mayor Amy Shuler Goodwin and as part of its ongoing commitment to community engagement, the Charleston Land Reuse Agency sought public input for the Riverview School Property on Wertz Avenue. Door-to-door outreach occurred from late April to late May with the public input chalkboard being posted on the property from May 11 – May 25, 2022. Significant gratitude is owed the Mr. Jim Harris for his leadership and coordination of outreach among his neighbors for this effort.

This process yielded productive engagement with residents. A total of 34 responses were collected including online and the chalkboard that was placed on the property. The chalkboard simply asked passersby “What belongs here is...”. The community responded with:

The online survey was shared via door-to-door outreach and linked by QR code on the chalkboard at the site. The survey asked the following questions:

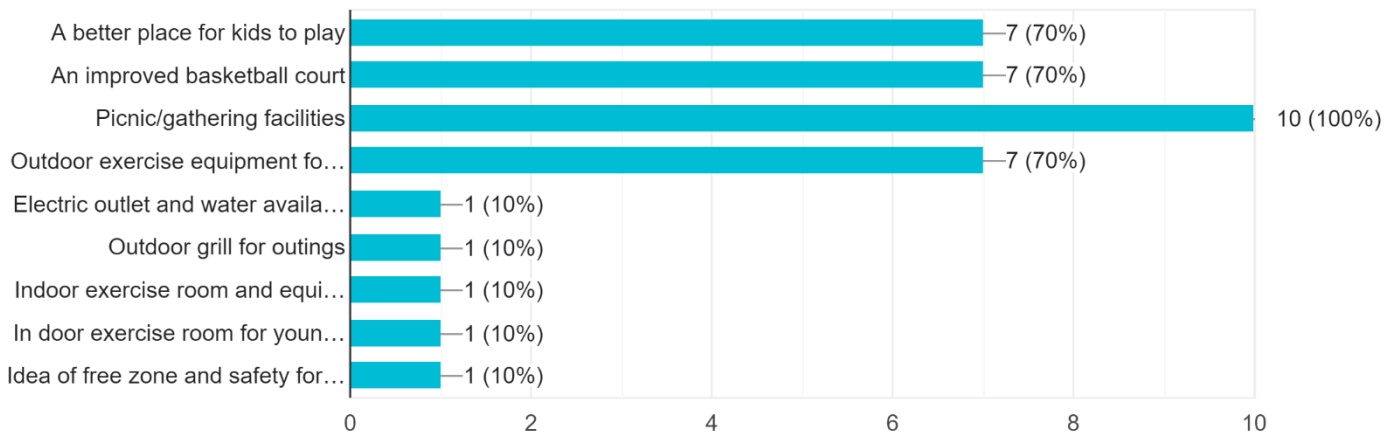
- What belongs here is...
- My community needs...
 - A better place for kids to play
 - An improved basketball court
 - Picnic/gathering facilities
 - Outdoor exercise equipment for adults
- The school property needs...
 - A deep cleaning

- Trash cans
 - A better layout
 - Improved lighting
 - New playground equipment
 - To keep most of the pavement for kids to ride bikes
 - Places for grownups to sit while their kids play
 - A permanent fire pit
 - A picnic shelter
- What memories do you have of the Riverview School or grounds, especially when you gathered there with friends and neighbors?

A total of 10 complete survey responses were collected. This survey gives a greater level of depth with both open-ended and multiple choice questions. Respondents prioritized the following when asked “My community needs...”:

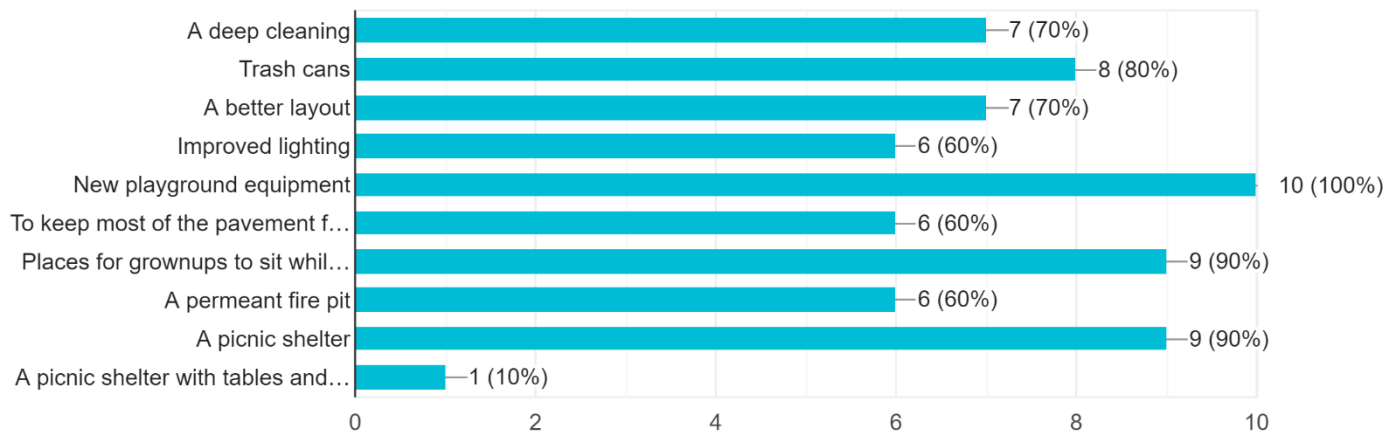
There is consensus that “Picnic/Gathering Facilities” are wanted for the property. Recreation opportunities, especially for children are also strongly desired.

Several of the answers to the open-ended question asking respondents to recount memories of the property recall community gatherings at the property; halloween parties, cake walks, church picnics, etc. Clearly, a place to gather, eat, and have fellowship is still much desired and sorely needed.

Similarly, there is consensus on desired physical improvements to the site with more than 90% of respondents asking for “New playground equipment”, “Places for grownups to sit while their kids play”, and “A picnic shelter”.

Another theme that came out in responses was the need for more regular maintenance on the site, cutting back overgrown trees, and the need for trash cans.

The public input chalkboard was very highly utilised with many responses likely coming from young people. Kids clearly loved drawing on the board, but also provided great input. Many responses asked for a pool, improved play equipment, and better seating. This space already serves as the center of community activity, especially for youth.

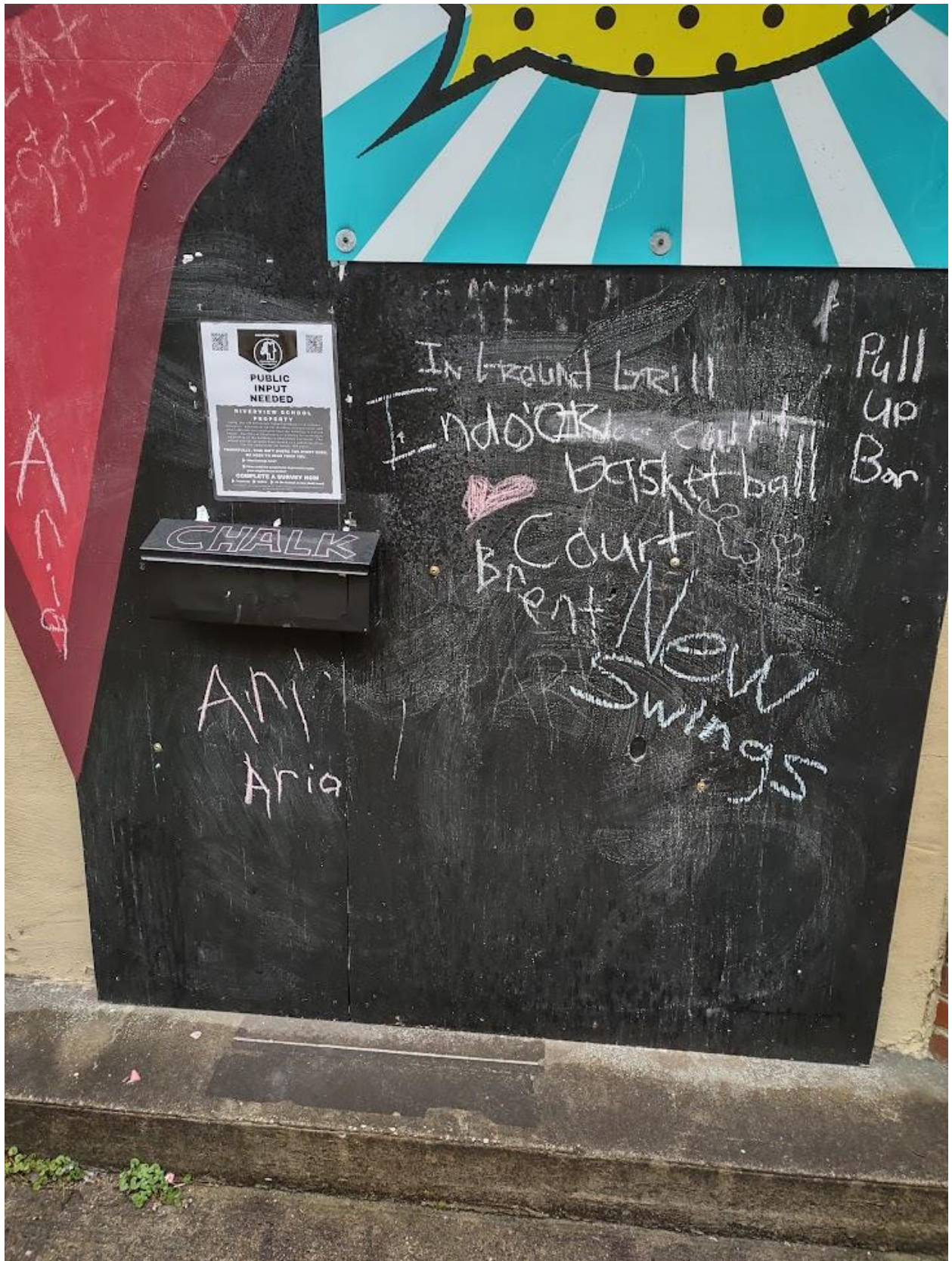
In total, the responses that were received show that residents are largely looking for the property to remain the hub of community activity in their neighborhood with improvements to the condition and amenities of the property. Many responses asked for a new, single-level community center with exercise equipment. Incorporating healthy lifestyle and recreation into the site is on the mind of residents. The ability to gather together is also critical as the property enters its next phase of life. Many memories shared recall the friends and family that gathered on the site. The community emphatically wants this legacy to live on as the school structure is removed and improvements are made.
